<u>September 20th</u> East Fox Lake Cemetery Walk

Join us for a trip back in time...back to old Monaville...back to the early settlers of Lake Villa. Please meet at the cemetery, 24306 W Monaville Road, Lake Villa, at 2 pm. Walk along with us as we meet Stuart Hoehne, Alexander Tweed, Charles Hucker, Robert Hook, Chief Barnstable, James Atwell, and a few other surprise characters. Learn about the hardships that faced our early pioneers, and the generous souls that gave up their land to create this "burying ground". This will be a 1 ½ hour presentation and involve some walking outdoors over uneven ground.



"The stones often reflect the hardships of pioneer life. One marker records the death of a seventeenyear-old wife, another the deaths of several children during a span of a few days. People buried here saw many changes in the boundaries of their land which

surrounded the cemetery. In 1787 it was part of the Northwest Territory of the United States, then it became a part of Wisconsin, next a part of McHenry County, then Avon Township of Lake County, and finally, in 1913, Lake Villa Township". (from the Bicentennial History of the East Fox Lake Cemetery, written by Helen Stratton Cremin, who also lies at rest in this cemetery.)



History on the Table

The following recipes were found in the Souvenir Cook Book, 1903, Compiled and Published by the ladies of Lake Villa, IL.

Allendale Soup

For Two quarts: One teacup of peas, boiled until tender; strain; if soaked overnight, add boiling water; if not, add cold water; let simmer slowly; when nearly done add one-half pound salt pork, cut in small cubes and dried out, well browned; season to taste, adding three or four onions, chopped fine. (Page 35) --George Chaffee, Mrs. Higbee, Allendale Farm

Crust for Meat Pies or Biscuits

Two scant teacups of lard or shortening, two quarts of flour, five teaspoons of baking powder, two teaspoons of salt; rub shortening in flour very thoroughly without previous melting, or until it looks nearly as fine as meal; add very cold water or sweet milk, enough to make a stiff paste, stirring all as quickly and as little as possible to get it in shape of roll; bake in quick oven. Much depends on quality of baking powder and flour. (Page 4)

Page from the Past

This year, 2022, marks the 125th Anniversary of a Lake Villa landmark, first known as Allendale Farm, now known as the Allendale Association. The Lake Villa Historical Society is planning to celebrate and honor this Allendale milestone more fully later in the year, complete with an informative program and facility tour. For now, we present an article reprinted from <u>A History of</u> <u>Lake County, Illinois</u>, copyright 1912.



The Allendale Community

The wide and favorably known institution, by name, Allendale Farm, is a home for the benefit of homeless and neglected boys, Edward L. Bradley being its founder, director and chief ruling spirit.

It is located on the west shore of Cedar Lake, at Lake Villa, Lake County, on the Wisconsin Central Railway.

The community of about sixty boys, is organized as a Junior Municipality, with a Mayor and City Council and a Court and Police Department. Groups, or families, are formed, of from eight to ten boys each; each group with its own cottage home, presided over by a mother or father, who has in charge the home life of the boys.

A money system has also been established, each citizen being paid for his labor and charged for his board and clothes in Allendale legal tender. The farm at Lake Villa represents an investment of \$40,000. The property is held in trust by the Allendale Association of Chicago, incorporated under the laws of the State of Illinois, its object being "to protect, rear, educate, elevate and provide for homeless and neglected boys."

Some sixteen years ago, Edward L. Bradley, a Princeton man of the Class of 1884, came from Philadelphia to Chicago and began to work on the problem, how to give the homeless boy a chance. His first venture was to rent a vacant store and open a clubhouse for boys in the poorest district he could find. Then one summer, he gathered together a few boys and opened a camp on the shores of Cedar Lake. During these summer months, ideas in Mr. Bradley's mind were taking definite shape and that fall witnessed the birth of "Allendale Farm." A lease of forty acres of land on the site of the summer camp was taken, and with eight boys, in a cheaply constructed summer cottage, was spent the first winter, and the first ideas worked themselves out into a well-formulated plan. The fall of 1897 marked the beginning of Allendale as a permanent home for boys. To the original forty acres, land has been added, until the Farm includes a quarter section in a rich agricultural region, with about twenty buildings, stock valued at \$1,473.50, and farm machinery at a valuation of \$771.00. But it is not in these material things the true value of Allendale Farm lies, but in the development of sterling character and good citizenship being achieved by Mr. Bradley and his co-workers in the youthful lives of the members of the community and which should enlist the sympathy and hearty support of every resident of Lake County.



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Hickory Knoll Golf Course

Looking for some fun, *and some history,* in Lake Villa? Then look no further than the newly restored Hickory Knoll Golf Course! Located on the southwest corner of Monaville & Fairfield Roads, this nature preserve has provided sporting fun for generations since 1947.

According to an 1885 plat map, this property was then owned by W.P Nelson, a prominent member of the Monaville community. Nelson was the owner of Nelson & Sons Paint Shop in Chicago, located right next door to E.J. Lehmann's "The Fair" Department store. The two business owners were friends, in fact, it was Nelson who first introduced Lehmann to the beauty and potential of the Lake Villa area. This 29.5-acre parcel was later owned by the Gernhardt family, and operated as a golf course since 1947.

When first established, military bases throughout the area would bus over military personnel to play a round of golf for only a nickel. Many generations have since enjoyed this wooded and rolling retreat.

In 2017, the old relic fell into foreclosure and shut its doors. The property was then purchased for \$400,000 by the North Shore Capital Group in 2020 and with another \$450,000 in improvements, has undergone a major redevelopment. Future plans include rebuilding an old structure near the 6th hole to become "Grandma Marie's Lemonade Stand", in honor of the Gernhardt family matriarch.

Sun and wind, swimming and skating, enough food, play and work, and a normal, quiet family life...all these things come down like rain upon the hard, parched nature of the boy, and he blossoms."

Here are a few more glimpses of life at Allendale in the early years with "Cap" and Maude Bradley.

MEMORIAL SERVICES TO BE HELD THURSDAY FOR 'CAP' BRADLEY

Memorial services for Edward Lounsbury Bradley, who spent much of his life helping

underprivileged boys, will be held at 2:30 p.m. next Thursday at Allendale Farm.... Mr. Bradley, who was known as "Cap" by his young charges, was killed Friday in Santa Barbara, Cal., his winter home, in an automobile accident.



He was 76 years old. After services yesterday in California, where the body was cremated, the widow left for Chicago to be present at the memorial rites.

Mr. Bradley founded the Allendale farm in 1895 and directed it until his retirement in 1934. Youngsters were taken from Chicago's poor neighborhoods to the farm home and educated and trained under his supervision. It now includes a school from the fifth grade through the first year of high school. A Philadelphian, Mr. Bradley came to Chicago in 1886, two years after his graduation from Princeton university.

Fifty Years Ago

The following articles and ads appeared in the Lake Villa Record August- October 1972.



Peter J. Palombi, 42, is the new superintendent of the Lake Villa Grade School District. Board members, in a special meeting Sept. 1, named him to the post to replace Dr. Richard Hupper, who resigned to take a position as assistant superintendent in charge of curriculum in a Pennsylvania school district. Palombi will begin his duties Sept. 11.

Palombi was superintendent of Consolidated Unit District 323 in Winnebago, west of Rockford. He had held the post for mor than six years.

He received both his bachelor's degree and master's degree from Northern Illinois University...

The school board interviewed six candidates for the post, according to School Board President John La Paglia. "We felt with his background in a district similar to ours and his credentials made him best for the job," LaPaglia said.

Palombi's wife and 14-year-old daughter are expected to move in the area sometime in the next three months.
