History on the table:

The Lake Villa PTA Cook Book Issued in 1957 offers the following Holiday favorites:

Baked Cranberry Pudding

Esther Eichsteadt

½ c. sugar	2 tsp. baking powder sifted
½ c. milk	with 1 c. flour and ¼ tsp salt
2T. melted butter	1 c. cranberries, diced

Mix in order given. Bake at 350 about 30 minutes and serve with sauce.

Sauce:

½ c. butter	1 c. sugar
½ c. cream	2 T. Brandy

Melt all in double boiler.

Apple Crisp

Mrs. Edith Kucharski

4 c. sliced apples (6-8)	1 c. sugar
¼ c. water	¾ c. flour
1 tsp. cinnamon	7 T. butter

Place sliced apples in buttered 8 x 8" pan; mix water and cinnamon and pour over apples. Combine sugar, flour and butter until crumbly; spread over apples. Bake at 350 for 25-30 minutes or until apples are tender.

Suet Pudding

Mrs. Albert Kapple

1 c. brown sugar 3 c. flour
1 c. chopped suet 3 tsp. baking powder
1 c. raisins

Mix and place in greased mold; steam 3 hours. Dry a few minutes in oven.

"When the girl loves her grandmother's roses"

Do you know who the name of this Lake Villa Grandmother?

Here's the answer, thanks to Jennifer Evans, Granddaughter

A lifelong resident of Lake Villa, Jeanne Cribb Mack was born in 1919 in the house at 107 S. Milwaukee Avenue, to Mabel and John Kerr Cribb. The homestead was built by her grandfather, Ben Hamlin. She was the fifth child, preceded by Ben, Harold, Frank and John. She grew up during the Great Depression. When her mother passed during Jeanne's youth, she assumed many duties to run the household in an efficient manner, learning to bake bread and grow a garden. (You may have noticed driving by on Route 83 that she loved Zinnias and Gladiolas, mostly because they grew in her favorite color, red.) Perhaps out of necessity, she embraced every aspect of keeping a home that was comfortable and warm. She believed in hard work and civic duty. She was a member of the United Methodist Church in Lake Villa where she worked alongside the church women for events, helped decorate the altar each season, inscribed Bibles for confirmation classes, and participated in Meals on Wheels.

Jeanne married Joseph Mack from Chicago and had two children, Ron and Gail. The children grew up in the household where they helped care for their uncle Frank, who was struck by polio as a toddler. Uncle John was also a bachelor living with the family, and he ran a plumbing business. Ron moved to Colorado as an adult and started a family; he currently has two children and four grandchildren. Gail lives in Lake Villa and has three children and three grandchildren. Gail's oldest daughter lives in the family home on Milwaukee Avenue.

A PAGE FROM THE PAST...

Effinger's Hardware Store

Ten years ago marks the closing of Effinger True Value hardware store that was a staple in Lake Villa for 83 years. The multi-generational "Hardware Store," as many locals referred to it, was opened by John and Ada Effinger who moved to Lake Villa in 1921 where John worked at the local grocery store. In 1923, John went into the hardware business in the building on Cedar Avenue where American Family Insurance is now located. John and Ada's son, William (Bill) and his wife Carol helped when Bill's parents were on vacation. Bill and Carol started permanent work in the store in 1959. William took over the business when his father died in 1963. The Hardware Store was moved to a two story building located across Cedar Avenue from the original building. In 1966 the store was moved to its final home, 122 Grand Avenue, (currently the Sewing Source building). After working in the store for many years, Bill and Carol's youngest son, Mike and his wife Deb took over the store when Bill and Carol retired in 1991. Mike and Deb's daughters also worked in the store from time to time.

The Hardware Store was a place where you could not only walk in and get the parts or supplies needed to complete a home repair or improvement job, but you could also get advice.

It was a place where you could send your wife or teenager with a part, they would be met at the counter, “we need one of these” and they would immediately get you what you needed and send you on your way. You could buy almost anything from paint, seed, fishing gear to kitchen utensils and light bulbs. The Hardware Store was also a place where locals would gather to share stories. It wasn’t like the stores we shop today, it was a place where everyone knew your name.


With changes in the community and the economy, Mike and Deb made the decision to close the store in October 2006. The following is an excerpt from an article in the August 18, 2006 News-Sun by Joe Boesen.

Hard to say goodbye:

The large black register has been in the Effinger family for decades, along with the True Value Hardware store that surrounds it.

Effinger True Value has been supplying the Lake Villa community since 1923, when John Effinger started the store, but is now closing its doors after 83 years of business. According to his grandson Mike Effinger, “the big boys” are to blame.

Effinger, 51, is the current owner of the store and said that he is losing customers to bigger retail stores like Menards and Home Depot.

“People like convenience,” said Effinger, “Someone can go to a Home Depot and they can get everything they need, while their wife can go grocery shopping or clothes shopping at a store nearby.” Then, if they forget anything, they usually come to Effinger for the small purchase, he said.

Throughout the years, however, Effinger believes that his store has been nothing but convenient.

“The store is right in town and has always been here in the community,” Effinger said. “The same people like to come in and support the local hardware store.” In fact, Effinger knows 90 percent of his clientele by name.

According to Effinger the community around the store has changed since he was a kid. “We used to sell mostly farm equipment like seed and farm tools, but now the area has developed and changed,” he said. “We still sell seed and other farm equipment but we now sell tools that are useful to people living in neighborhoods.”

His father William took over the store in 1963 and as a kid, Effinger ran the aisles of the store and manned the counter helping customers. This translated to an intense knowledge of everything in the store, not only what aisle where things are located but how to use them.

“The customers appreciate the expertise I can offer them,” Effinger said. “I also repair all my own stuff, so I know exactly how to use the supplies I sell.”

As the guard dog Mocha, a 7-year-old dachshund, sleeps on the counter, Effinger explained the solid string of old lures hanging across the ceiling, found during fishing trips of the past. Over the counter, prize fish Effinger has caught over the years hang on the wall. One is particularly impressive: a 27 pound, 48 inch muskie caught in Cedar Lake, right across town.

Effinger has no time to fish anymore. “My father used to help me working the shop, giving me time to fish in the afternoon,” he said. “now it’s just me working the shop 90 percent of the time and occasionally my two daughters and wife help out.”

The closing of a business that lasted almost a century has stirred mixed emotions.

“I would like to keep the business going,” Effinger said. “All of the town wants to see us stay, but we can’t keep up with the bigger stores.”

According to Karen Curtis, long time resident of Lake Villa it is going to be a sad goodbye. “You always ran up to Effinger’s for everything and you didn’t even think about it,” Curtis said. “I

was always amazed with how much stuff they had.”

According to Scott Bartlett, resident of Lake Villa and customer of Effinger, it was a true hardware store. “They carried all kinds of hardware, and some very unique items. Everyone in the family was so knowledgeable and very helpful,” Bartlett said. “The store will definitely be missed.”

Effinger understands change, and although it has caused his store to close, he believes change is good. “I have to change with the times.” He said, and in this case, time has changed against places using the large old black register.
