Lake Villa's Beautiful Parks

Spring has sprung in Lake Villa! It's time to enjoy the beautiful outdoors, and as you do, consider the history and namesake origin of each of the Village's five parks.

Lehmann Park



Originally called Lehmann's Grove, Lake Villa's flagship park was deeded to the Village

by the Lehmann family in 1921. The deed states there shall be no commercial ice harvesting on Cedar Lake, or the land shall revert back to the family. You will find two Veteran's Memorials, a rose garden in memory of Edith Kotowicz, a monument honoring the 75th anniversary of the Lake Villa Volunteer Fire Dept. and a clock tower erected in 2001 to commemorate the Village's 100th anniversary. Rest under the shade of trees planted in memory of Robert Streicher, David Harms and Arlyn Popp, or enjoy the views of beautiful Cedar Lake from the Fred Popp Sr. bench.

Steven L Sherwood Park

Tucked away between Oak Knoll Drive and Kevin Avenue, this memorial park was



built in the mid 1970's in honor of Steven Lloyd Sherwood, son of Delbert and Shirley Sherwood. He was killed in a car accident in 1970 at the age of 18.

Frank M. Loffredo Park



Located in front of the historic Lehmann Mansion, this park was dedicated in 2010 to beloved and longtime Lake Villa Mayor, Frank Loffredo. The walking path around the park follows the same ½ mile footprint originally used as a racetrack for E.J. Lehmann's prized racehorses. Relax on the June Crichton bench and enjoy the view of a 300-year-old Oak tree (Bud Osmond's favorite).

Lake Villa Baseball Park

Led by Glenn McCollum and accomplished by an army of volunteers, this is truly Lake Villa's "Field of Dreams". Completed in 1999, the four fields in this park bear the names of principal players in the funding and construction of this complex. Field #1 honors project manager Glenn McCollum and committee president, Rich Coles. Field #2 is named for Cubs All-Star 3rd baseman. Ron Santo, who made numerous fundraising appearances at the ballpark. Field #3 remembers the Raymond Scarpelli family and the generous financial backing they provided. Field #4 commemorates the late State Representative Tim Osmond who worked securing construction grants for the park.

Glacier Park

Referencing the glacial origin of Deep Lake, this Village park was built in 1988 by the developers of Waters Edge Apartments.

Page from the Past: Lake Villa Schneider Family

Howard "Duke" Schneider, currently of Tarpon Springs, Florida, wrote a history of his family in Lake Villa. Here is an excerpt of his recollection, edited for length. The entire essay can be read at Lake Villa Historical Society.

My Father (Howard) was the oldest son and was born in Jamestown, North Dakota on January 1, 1914. He has five brothers (Willard; Leonard; Bernard; Maynard; Richard) and one sister (Doris) who were also born in Jamestown. Richard was the last child born in Jamestown and that was on February 10, 1924. Two sons (Walter, Jr. & Millard) as well as two sisters (Arlyn & Joyce) were born in Lake County, Illinois between March 4, 1928 and February 1, 1936.

In my mind there was always a question why the Schneider Family left Jamestown, North Dakota. Grandpa (Walter) had family in Milwaukee. I guess they began to consider settling in Southeastern Wisconsin or Northern Illinois. Well, the choice was definitely Lake County Illinois, and to be specific, Lake Villa. Early residence for the family was at the curve along the South side of Grand Avenue and West of Wedges Corner.

Construction took place for building, what we called, the 'Big Garage' during 1936. The building had three truck bays, the two North bays had concrete floors. The South Bay remained a dirt floor, so if a piece of equipment, taller than the door opening, needed to be moved into the building, dirt could be removed to allow passage into the building. On the extreme South Side of the building was a machine area, containing a drill press, a metal saw and steel work benches with vices for use holding and working on various items. The area also contained a metal barrel stove and numerous storage bins of all shapes and sizes.

The business began to evolve around trucking and excavation. Millard was learning to operate the Bay City Crane since Leonard's health was deteriorating after he returned from serving in the Army during World War II.

Howard married Frances Caroline Mols in Round Lake on June 20, 1936.

Some of the sons took employment elsewhere. Richard and Millard worked for Schneider's Trucking with both Bernard and Maynard working off and on at Schneider's Trucking. Harold Pullen worked for Schneider's Trucking for many years. Often on Saturdays, Fred Teltz and Fred Popp would drive truck.

My mother (Frances) and Father (Howard) divorced in May 1942. My mother and I moved to Waukegan where my mother took employment at Heinz's Department Store. When I spent time with my father, while my dad worked, I hung around Schneider's Trucking and Lake Villa.

My mother went on vacation to Florida and enjoyed herself enough that we moved to Tarpon Springs, Florida in 1949.

My dad owned a home located at Grub Hill, which is the intersection of Fairfield Road and Old Rollins Road. The house was at the foot of Grub Hill located on the East side of Fairfield Road. I remember walking that gravel road to Lake Villa to get a haircut at Reinbach's Barber Shop. While hanging out in Lake Villa, there was fishing, swimming in Cedar Lake or baseball in Lehmann Park. Highlight of the time were the summer movies which were shown on the Lake Villa Bank outside north brick wall.

While I was in high school, I would travel to Illinois to spend summers with my father. During the summer vacation of my junior and senior years I drove truck. Before returning to Florida near the end of the 1955 summer, Grandpa Schneider called me to the living room where he relaxed in his easy chair. He asked what I thought I should be paid for the work that I performed. I said how about \$2.00 per hour. His response was that nobody is worth \$2.00 per hour. I remember him giving me \$200.00 for my summer salary.

History on the Table

The following are recipes found in the LAKE VILLA PTA COOKBOOK, Issued 1957.

<u>Corn Pone</u> Mrs. Russell A. Douglas

One egg, one-quarter cup sugar (very scant), one cup sweet milk, one and one-half cups cornmeal, one tablespoon butter, one teaspoon baking powder, one half teaspoon salt. Beat egg, add sugar, salt, melted butter, milk and meal. Stir baking powder into flour and add this just before baking. Bake in gem pans in hot oven fifteen to twenty minutes. This makes one dozen.

<u>Television Snack Dips</u> Mrs. Gordon Martin

- 1. Use equal amounts of cream cheese and blue cheese. Mash and soften with sour cream or cream. Spice with chopped olives.
- 2. Mash liverwurst; add grated onion juice and moisten with salad dressing.
- 3. Mix ground cooked ham with finely chopped hard cooked eggs; add a bit of chopped sweet pickle and mayonnaise to moisten

Creamy Cucumber Salad Mrs. Winsor Dalgaard

1 pkg. lime jello 1 tsp. minced onion

 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. hot water $\frac{1}{2}$ c. milk

1 tsp. vinegar ½ c. cottage cheese ¾ tsp. salt ½ c. chopped cucumber ½ c. mayonnaise. 3 T. chopped green pepper

Dissolve jello in water; add vinegar and salt. Stir in mayonnaise, onion and milk; beat and chill. When slightly thickened, fold in cottage cheese, cucumber and pepper. Mold and chill.

One More Look at Camp Hastings

In February, the LVHS enjoyed an informative program from Carl Powell detailing his experiences and memories growing up as the caretaker's son on the Camp Hastings YMCA property in Lake Villa. Here's one last bit of trivia about that storied and colorful place...



"In the turbulence of early 1968, while the Democrats were planning their National Convention in Chicago, a group of young activists were making plans of their own. Leaders of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam met at the Camp Hastings YMCA campground in Lake Villa to decide on methods of protest during the convention; and how to manipulate the media into drawing attention to their antiwar rallies. It must have been a shocking site- Abbie Hoffman in full Indian headdress, Rennie Davis, Jerry Rubin, Tom Hayden and others; black and white, long-haired and crew-cut, bell bottoms and chinos, beads and blazers, sandals and penny loafers. In the end, the conference failed to find a united front, in part due to the differing beliefs of the members and in part because of the infiltration by undercover agents.

From Our Collection



This stylish swimwear was worn by Betty Slazes, wife of Lake Villa Fire Department chief Frank Slazes while taking part in Lake Villa Days ladies' water fights in the 1960's. The original owner is unknown.

It is based on swimwear from the early 1900's when women wore heavy suits that limited their movement and weighed them down in the water. It was fashion-forward to have a one-piece suit with the blouse and trousers attached. The mid-calf length was to detract from a woman's figure while the dark colors kept wetness from showing through.

In the 1920's women could be fined if their swimwear was too short.
